Title Bayesian Modeling of Spatial Count Data

Description Provides a collection of functions for preparing data and fitting Bayesian count spatial regression models, with a specific focus on the Gamma-Count (GC) model. The GC model is well-suited for modeling dispersed count data, including under-dispersed or over-dispersed counts, or counts with equivalent dispersion, using Integrated Nested Laplace Approximations (INLA). The package includes functions for generating data from the GC model, as well as spatially correlated versions of the model. 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GC	<i>Gamma-Count (GC) Distribution</i>
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Description

Density, distribution function, quantile function and random generation for the GC distribution with parameters α and γ .

Usage

`G(alpha, gamma)`

`dGC(y, alpha, gamma)`

`pGC(q, alpha, gamma, lower.tail = TRUE)`

`qGC(p, alpha = 1, gamma)`

`rGC(n = 1, alpha = 1, gamma = gamma, method = "PF")`

Arguments

<code>alpha</code>	the dispersion parameter of GC: default is 1; (shape parameter of waiting time variable);
<code>gamma</code>	the rate parameter of GC and waiting time variable;
<code>y</code>	a vector or matrix of observations for which the pdf needs to be computed.
<code>q</code>	a vector or matrix of quantiles for which the cdf needs to be computed.
<code>lower.tail</code>	logical; if TRUE (default), probabilities are $P(Y \geq y)$; otherwise, $P(Y > y)$.
<code>p</code>	a vector or matrix of probabilities for which the quantile needs to be computed.
<code>n</code>	number of random values to be generated.
<code>method</code>	Character string. The method used for generating random variables from the GC distribution in 'rGC'. Options are: - "PF": Based on the probability function. - "IT": Inverse transformation method based on the quantile function. - "WT": Based on the waiting times distribution.

Details

The GC distribution with parameters α and γ has the density

$$P(Y_T = y) = G(y\alpha, \gamma T) - G((y + 1)\alpha, \gamma T)$$

where

$$G(n\alpha, \gamma T) = \frac{1}{\Gamma(n\alpha)} \int_0^{\gamma T} u^{n\alpha-1} \exp(-u) du$$

for α and λ which must be positive values and $y \in \{0, 1, 2, \dots\}$.

Value

G gives the G function, pGC gives the distribution function, dGC gives the density, qGC gives the quantile function and rGC generates random variables from the GC Distribution.

Fit ICAR Spatial Gamma-Count Model

Description

This function fits an ICAR spatial Gamma-Count (GC) model to a given dataset using the INLA package. It constructs the formula based on the provided covariate data and ID variables, and fits the model using the specified adjacency matrix ('W') or a shapefile of the study region.

Usage

Arguments

Y	Vector of response variables (counts).
ID	Vector of indexes of regions (spatial units).

shapefile	Optional shapefile representing the study region. If provided, the adjacency matrix ('W') will be calculated from the shapefile.
covariate	Optional matrix of covariates. If not provided, the function assumes the model is intercept-only.

An object of class "inla" representing the fitted ICAR spatial GC model. The object contains model estimates, diagnostics, and other results.

Description

This function fits a negative binomial spatial model (including zero-inflated variations) to a given dataset using the INLA package. The function constructs the formula based on the provided covariate data and ID variables, and fits the model using the specified adjacency matrix ('W') or a shapefile of the study region.

Description

This function fits a Poisson spatial model (including zero-inflated and gamma Poisson variations) to a given dataset using the INLA package. It constructs the formula based on the provided covariate data and ID variables, and fits the model using the specified adjacency matrix ('W') or a shapefile of the study region.

Generate a Random Adjacency Matrix

Description

This function generates a random adjacency matrix for a given number of regions. The matrix is symmetric, and the upper triangular part (excluding the diagonal) is randomly generated using the `rbinom` function with a specified probability. The lower triangular part is filled in by reflecting the upper triangular part to ensure the matrix is symmetric.

Usage

```
rAdj(n, prob = 0.2)
```

Arguments

n	Integer. The number of regions, which determines the dimensions of the adjacency matrix. Must be a positive integer.
prob	Numeric. The probability of an edge (connection) between two regions, used as the probability for the binomial distribution. Default value is 0.2. Should be between 0 and 1 (inclusive).

Value

A symmetric numeric matrix of dimensions $n \times n$ representing the adjacency matrix. The values in the matrix are either 0 or 1, where 1 indicates an edge (connection) between two regions.

Examples

Generate Data from GC Spatial Regression Model with Geospatial Dependency

Description

This function generates spatially dependent count data based on the Gamma-Count (GC) spatial regression model. It uses a specified geospatial dependency model with parameters such as ‘sigma’ for variance and ‘range’ for spatial range. The function returns a list containing the generated data and relevant information about the simulation.

Usage

Arguments

n	Integer. The number of knots (or spatial units) for which the data should be generated.
alpha	Numeric. The dispersion parameter of the Gamma-Count model.
beta0	Numeric. The intercept term for the model.
beta	Numeric vector. The regression coefficients (fixed effects) for the model.
V	Optional numeric. The variance of the spatial random effects for lattice data.
rho	Optional numeric. The spatial correlation coefficient for the CAR model. Default is 1.
sigma	Optional numeric. The variance of the spatial random effects for geospatial data with Matern covariance.
range	Optional numeric. The range parameter for geospatial data with Matern covariance.

Value

A list containing the following components:

covariate A matrix of covariates with the specified number of knots (‘n’) and columns based on the length of ‘beta’.

- phi** A vector of spatial random effects generated from the Matern covariance model.
- eta** A vector representing the linear predictor, calculated as the dot product of the covariates and coefficients plus the spatial effects ('phi').
- mu** A vector of mean response values calculated as the product of 'alpha' and the exponential of 'eta'.
- y** A vector of simulated count data based on the GC model and the mean response values ('mu').
- ID** A vector of knot IDs from 1 to 'n'.

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Description

This function generates spatially dependent count data based on the Gamma-Count (GC) spatial regression model. It uses a specified spatial dependency model (either ICAR or CAR) and optional adjacency matrix or shapefile for spatial relationships. The function returns a list containing the generated data and relevant information about the simulation.

Usage

Arguments

n	Integer. The number of knots (or spatial units) for which the data should be generated. If a shapefile or adjacency matrix ('W') is provided, this will be determined from those inputs.
alpha	Numeric. The dispersion parameter of the Gamma-Count model.
beta0	Numeric. The intercept term for the model.
beta	Numeric vector. The regression coefficients (fixed effects) for the model.
spatial	Character. Specifies the type of spatial dependency to use. Options are "ICAR" for Intrinsic Conditional Autoregressive, or "CAR" for Conditional Autoregressive.
W	Optional matrix. The adjacency matrix for lattice data. If provided, it will be used to define spatial relationships between knots.
V	Optional numeric. The variance of the spatial random effects for lattice data.
rho	Optional numeric. The spatial correlation coefficient for the CAR model. Default is 1.
shapefile	Optional. A shapefile defining the spatial relationships between knots. If provided, it will be used to define an adjacency matrix.

Value

A list containing the following components:

covariate A matrix of covariates with the specified number of knots ('n') and columns based on the length of 'beta'.

phi A vector of spatial random effects, generated based on the specified spatial dependency model ('spatial').

eta A vector representing the linear predictor, calculated as the dot product of the covariates and coefficients plus the spatial effects ('phi').

y A vector of simulated count data based on the GC model and the linear predictor ('eta').

ID A vector of knot IDs from 1 to 'n'.

`spatCAR`*Generate Spatial Random Fields from CAR Models*

Description

This function generates spatial random fields from Conditional Autoregressive (CAR) models for lattice spatial data. Given a neighborhood matrix, a variance parameter, and a spatial dependence parameter, the function produces a spatial random field.

Usage

```
spatCAR(W, sig, rho)
```

Arguments

<code>W</code>	Numeric matrix. The neighborhood matrix representing the adjacency relationships between spatial units. It can be provided by using the function <code>rAdj</code> .
<code>sig</code>	Numeric. The variance of the spatial random effects from the CAR model. Must be positive.
<code>rho</code>	Numeric. The spatial dependence parameter for the CAR model. Must be between -1 and 1, inclusive.

Details

The function starts by computing the diagonal matrix of the number of neighbors for each spatial unit. Then, it calculates the precision matrix (Q) based on the given parameters and neighborhood matrix. A small constant (0.0001) is added to the diagonal to ensure the precision matrix is non-singular. Finally, the covariance matrix is calculated as the inverse of the precision matrix multiplied by the variance parameter (`sig`). The function uses multivariate normal random generation (using `rmvnorm` from the `mvtnorm` package) to produce the spatial random field.

Value

A numeric vector representing the spatial random field from the CAR model. The length of the vector is equal to the number of spatial units (rows in the neighborhood matrix).

Examples

`spatGEO`*Generate Spatial Random Fields from Matern Covariance Model*

Description

This function generates spatial random fields from the Matern covariance model for geospatial data. Given a number of knots, a variance parameter, and a range parameter, the function produces a spatial random field from the Matern covariance model.

Usage

```
spatGEO(m, sigma, range)
```

Arguments

<code>m</code>	Integer. The number of knots (or spatial units) for which the spatial random field should be generated.
<code>sigma</code>	Numeric. The variance of the spatial random effects with Matern covariance. Must be positive.
<code>range</code>	Numeric. The range of the spatial random effects with Matern covariance. Must be positive.

Details

The function starts by converting the variance (`'sigma'`) and range (`'range'`) parameters into the tau and kappa parameters required for the Matern covariance model. Then, it constructs a mesh for the given number of knots, defining the spatial layout of the data. The function uses INLA functions (`'inla.spde2.matern'` and others) to create an SPDE object and set the priors for the spatial model. It then projects the mesh and constructs a predictor for the model. Finally, the function calculates the precision matrix, samples from the distribution, and computes the spatial random field using the A matrix and sampled values.

Value

A numeric vector representing the spatial random field from the Matern covariance model. The length of the vector is equal to the number of knots specified by the parameter `'m'`.

Examples

`spatICAR`*Generate Spatial Random Fields from ICAR Models*

Description

This function generates spatial random fields from Intrinsic Conditional Autoregressive (ICAR) models for lattice spatial data. Given an adjacency matrix and a variance parameter, the function produces a spatial random field from the ICAR model.

Usage

```
spatICAR(W, sig = 1)
```

Arguments

<code>W</code>	Numeric matrix. The adjacency matrix representing the adjacency relationships between spatial units. It can be provided by using the function ‘generate_adjacency_matrix’.
<code>sig</code>	Numeric. The variance of the spatial random effects from the ICAR model. Must be positive. Default value is 1.

Details

The function starts by computing the degree of each spatial unit (number of neighbors) from the adjacency matrix. Then, it constructs the precision matrix (Q) based on the adjacency matrix. The function computes the eigenvalues and eigenvectors of Q . To generate the spatial random field, it uses a standard normal distribution to generate a vector of random numbers, scales the random numbers by the variance and the inverse of the eigenvalues (excluding the smallest eigenvalue), and then transforms the random numbers using the eigenvectors. The function returns a spatial random field vector.

Value

A numeric vector representing the spatial random field from the ICAR model. The length of the vector is equal to the number of spatial units (columns in the adjacency matrix).

Examples
