

Package ‘pandemics’

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Description Full dynamic system to describe and forecast the spread and the severity of a developing pandemic, based on available data. These data are number of infections, hospitalizations, deaths and recoveries notified each day. The system consists of three transitions, infection-infection, infection-hospital and hospital-death/recovery. The intensities of these transitions are dynamic and estimated using non-parametric local linear estimators. The package can be used to provide forecasts and survival indicators such as the median time spent in hospital and the probability that a patient who has been in hospital for a number of days can leave it alive. Methods are described in Gámiz, Mammen, Martínez-Miranda, and Nielsen (2024) <[doi:10.48550/arXiv.2308.09918](https://doi.org/10.48550/arXiv.2308.09918)> and <[doi:10.48550/arXiv.2308.09919](https://doi.org/10.48550/arXiv.2308.09919)>.

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pandemics-package	<i>Monitoring a Developing Pandemic with Available Data.</i>
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Description

Full dynamic system to describe and forecast the spread and the severity of a developing pandemic based on typically available data. The system involves three different transitions: infection-infection, infection-hospitalization and hospitalization-death/recovery. The intensities of these transitions are dynamic and estimated using nonparametric local linear estimators.

Estimation is performed from aggregated data consisting of number of infections (positive tests), hospitalizations, deaths and recoveries notified each day.

The package can be used to provide forecasts of new infections, hospitalizations and deaths, as well as typical survival indicators such as the median time from admission in hospital to recovery or death, or the probability that a patient who has been in hospital for a number of days can leave it alive.

Forecasting infections, hospitalizations and deaths in hospital.

Description

Forecasting infections, hospitalizations and deaths in hospital. From estimated two-dimensional rates of infections and hospitalizations and estimated hazards of deaths and recoveries, new infections, hospitalizations and deaths are predicted in a forecasting period.

Arguments

Cval	a numeric value with the infection indicator. Default value is Cval=1.
period	an integer value with the number of days to forecast.
RoInf	a matrix with the estimated rate of infection (M-1 times M-1) estimated from M days, evaluating the function <code>rate2Dmiss</code> .
RoHosp	(optional) a matrix with the estimated rate of hospitalization (M times M), obtained evaluating the function <code>rate2Dmiss</code> .

Details

To create estimated rates and hazards for the arguments evaluate the functions `hazard2Dmiss` and `rate2Dmiss`. If the argument `RoHosp` is missing then only infections are predicted. If any of the argument `RoDeath` or `RoRec` is missing then deaths (recoveries) are not predicted.

The infection indicator `Cval` is typically provided by experts. At the more recent observation (t), it indicates whether the future ($t+h$, $h > 0$) will be different or equal to the immediate past. If `Cval=1` then we can forecast the immediate future based on the immediate past. There might be periods where little is happening (and the indicator might have a tendency to increase slowly) and there might be few but very important change-points where measures (e.g. lock down) are introduced to minimize future infections (and the indicator might drop dramatically in a matter of days). See Gámiz et al. (2024a) for more details and the relationship to the well-known reproduction number.

Local Linear Estimator of the Two-Dimensional Marker-Dependent Hazard.

Description

Local linear estimator of the marker-dependent hazard introduced by Nielsen (1998). The implementation considers two dimensions only: a one-dimensional marker and time (duration). It assumes aggregated data in the form of occurrences and exposure. The bandwidth can be provided or estimated using cross-validation (see details below).

Details

The marker-dependent hazard local linear estimator was introduced by Nielsen (1998) and bandwidth selection provided by Gámiz et al. (2013). It assumes the Aalen multiplicative intensity model. The function implements such estimator in the case of a one-dimensional marker only (first

dimension). Data are assumed to be aggregated in the form of occurrences and exposure (see Gámiz et al. 2013) in a two-dimensional grid of values (z,t) .

The estimator involves on a two-dimensional kernel function and a two-dimensional bandwidth. The implemented kernel is multiplicative with $K(u)=(3003/2048)*(1-(u^2)^6)*(abs(u)<1)$. The bandwidth can be provided in the argument `bs.grid` in the form of a matrix (2 times 1). Data-driven bandwidth selection is also supported. If `cv=TRUE` (default) then the bandwidth is estimated using cross-validation from a grid of `nb` two-dimensional bandwidths provided in `bs.grid` (`nb` times 2).

This marker-dependent hazard local linear estimator assumes that full information is available in the form of occurrences and exposures. In a emergent or developing pandemic, this estimator will most likely be infeasible from typically available data. Thus, the estimator will be computed after the necessary information is estimated through the function `hazard2Dmiss()`. See Gámiz et al. (2022,2024a,b) for more details.

Value

`hi.zt` A (`M` times `M`) matrix with the estimated hazard evaluated at the grid points.
`bcv` A two-dimensional vector with the bandwidth used to compute the estimator (estimated by cross-validation if `cv=TRUE`).

Note

Infeasible estimator to be evaluated through the function `hazard2Dmiss()`.

Local Linear Estimator of the Two-Dimensional Marker-Dependent Hazard from Missing-Survival-Link Data.

Description

Local linear estimator of the marker-dependent hazard in the case of missing-survival-link data. Hazard is assumed to have two dimensions: a one-dimensional marker (typically the notification date) and time (duration). It is assumed the situation of observing aggregated data in the form of occurrences and exposures. The missing-survival link problem means that the duration is not directly observed. The estimator follows from an iterative algorithm where, at each step, full information including duration is estimated first and then, the local linear estimator is computed evaluating the function hazard2D.

Details

Hazard is assumed having two dimensions: a one-dimensional marker and time. It is assumed the situation of observing aggregated data in the form of occurrences and exposure, as the function `hazard2D` does. The difference is that the time dimension (duration) is not observed. The estimator follows from an iterative algorithm where, at each step, full information, estimating the duration, is constructed first and then the local linear estimator is computed by evaluating the function `hazard2D`.

Missing-link-survival data means that duration is not observed directly. Each day (z), we get information on number of people remaining in hospital (exposure, $Ei.z$), the number of deaths ($Oi1.z$) and the number of recoveries ($Oi2.z$) on that day.

Value

Local Linear Estimator of the Two-Dimensional Infection (or Hospitalization) Rate from Missing-Survival-Link Data.

Description

Local linear estimator of the infection or the hospitalization rate in the case of missing-survival-link data (Gámiz et al. 2024a). The rate is assumed to have two dimensions: a one-dimensional marker (typically the notification date) and time (duration). It is assumed the situation of observing aggregated data in the form of occurrences and exposures. The missing-survival link problem means that the duration is not directly observed. The estimator follows from an iterative algorithm where, at each step, full information including duration is estimated first and then, the local linear estimator is computed evaluating the function hazard2D.

Arguments

t.grid	a vector of M grid points for the time dimension.

Details

Hazard is assumed having two dimensions: a one-dimensional marker (typically the notification date) and time (duration). It is assumed the situation of observing aggregated data in the form of occurrences and exposure, as the function `hazard2D` does. The difference is that the time dimension (duration) is not directly observed. The estimator follows from an iterative algorithm where, at each step, full information, estimating the duration, is constructed first and then the local linear estimator is computed evaluating the function `hazard2D`. See more details on the local linear hazard estimator in the documentation of [hazard2D](#).

To estimate the infection rate we assume that each day (z), we have information on the number of people tested positive. The vector of occurrences ($O_i.z$) is the observed number of people tested positive each day, removing the first d days. Here d is typically 1 (an infected person might infect one day after being tested positive), see the examples below. The vector of exposure ($E_i.z$) is the observed number of people tested positive each day, removing the last d days.

To estimate the hospitalization rate we assume that each day (z), we have information on the number of new hospitalizations ($O_i.z$), and the number of people tested positive ($E_i.z$) each day.

Value

<code>bcv</code>	a two-dimensional vector with the bandwidth used to compute the estimator (estimated by cross-validation if <code>cv=TRUE</code>).
